We are just starting to review Speaker Events for 2025. Is there anyone you would like to hear from, or any subject you would like to hear about? Please let us know your thoughts.


We are happy to announce that the FLH has received another donation from the Rockway Community Centre fund. Thank you to all involved and Hilda Wiley for recommending us.

We are looking for pictures, any memories or memorabilia from the Beamsville Train Station. We have several pictures and information on the Jordan Train Station, but we have very little information regarding the Beamsville Station. Would you be able to help us? Do you have old photos, tickets or train schedules you may be hanging on to? Maybe you have old photos of loved ones leaving from the station. We would love to see them. The Archives only has 4 items in our collection regarding the station. The three pictures directly below are all we have. We also have one newspaper article; "Down at the Station", reprinted from The Beamsville Express in 1955. Do you know what happened to the building after the station closed. We still do not have an exact date for when it was torn down. If you know, please let us know!

DOWN AT THE STATION



This group was snapped at Beamsville Station somewhere about 1902-03, and includes the following, some of whom have since passed on: John McIntyre, who was station agent. Sandy Craig: the small son of Mr McIntyre who was drowned one Christmas Day in the creek near the station; Joe Ryckman, latterly of St Catharines; George House, who was an inspector for the Hydro; Charles "Pete" Tallman, for many years a barber in Beamsville and bandmaster of the Beamsville Citizens Band, later superintendent of the County Buildings in St Catharines; Aubrey Fleming, founder of Fleming's Chick Hatchery here; Harry and Charlie Luey; seated on the truck handles are Charley and Kenneth Craig. Elma Terryberry and Mitt Luey. On the truck itself are Archie Allen, at that time a clerk in the store of Hagar and Hall, where the Beamsville Dairy Bar new stands; Hazel McIntyre, Beulah Garbutt (Mrs Sexton, of Detroit), and Freeman Scott, Toronto, also a clerk at Hall's.

John Allan sent us the picture of the train tickets (right), and he also shared the following memory with us.

"As kids we would walk down Konkle creek and put coins on the track to be flattened, and then walk to Grandmother Strong's store to by a 5-cent popsicle and then likely return up the creek to our tree house in the woods. Nort Strong's fuel supply building, which was on the northwest corner of Green Lane & Ontario Street, and between him and the Station was John Abrams roofing and storage shed that may have belong to the railway at one time"

Thank you to John and Lewis Coffman. After the road construction article in our last newsletter, they both sent in this picture of their grandfather standing near an old Steam Roller.

Lewis went on to say that the Chambers Family came to Canada in 1912. John said he believes that the picture was taken in the early 1900s.





We had a member respond to the above picture which we used on our "History of Farming" poster", from our last speaker event. The response came from Larry Rittenhouse in Victoria, BC. He emailed us his memory of the picture.

- "It was taken at S H Rittenhouse farm around 1950-53.
- "It features a Bartlet fruit/cherry sorter, electric powered. Sour cherries are being sorted. The continuous belt tumbled and turned fruit over 3 tiers where damaged fruit could be spotted. Initially fruit was brought into the barn for soring and basketing. This was found to be too remote from the orchard.
- Using heavy house wiring as a very long extension cord, and mounting the sorter on a large drag sled made the sorting operation portable. There were 4 points of electricity on the farm, Lake side north and south end, but I believe the cord was still over 400 yards long. In later years I helped drag it and coil it. There was a mini drama on start up when the demand surge took a long time. I remember hands-on the big belt pushing it to move.
- It worked with savings and economies! Hence the picture and article.
- Pictured from lower right, receiving sorted cherries is the oldest of S H Rittenhouse's 3 sons Charles. The, counter-clockwise, Reg Rittenhouse, and next to Reg is the youngest son, Paul Rittenhouse (My Dad!).
- Continuing counterclockwise Mrs. Bilinski, too old for the higher wages of piece work cherry picking, A few years later when I served on the grader next to Mrs. B, I discovered she always had a clove, or two of garlic in her left cheek. Remember this is way before we started sprinkling garlic powder on our BBQ steaks.
- Pictured from the top and continuing counterclockwise. That is my older brother Denis, pouring cherries at the correct rate. I infer from his age the picture is from the early 50s. The, I think, Marylin, Reg's younger daughter. Not clear on the final 2: one of the Senella sisters? And I think Mr. Bilinski, not sure of his garlic consumption.
- As stated, I took over pouring. It varied with the fruit quality and grader staffing. Other duties included set up, as mentioned and finding where the cord needed splicing.
