

S.S. #7 Mud Creek (Later Spring Creek School) Conc. 9, Lot 15 & 16 Clinton



The first school was built of logs in the early 1790s on Lot 15, Conc. 9 in Clinton Township on the farm of Peter Zimmerman. It stood just east of Eden Cemetery.

In 1824 a new frame school was built to replace the old log school and it stood on the same site as the log school.

Records show that George Zimmerman sold the land on April 25, 1848 to the Niagara District Council for the Spring Creek School. It was part of the west part of Lot 15, Conc. 9. Tremaine's map of 1862 doesn't show the school on Lot 16, Conc. #9, but records at the registry office show that Isaac Book sold ½ acre of Lot 16 in the 9 Conc. to the school trustees on March 31, 1862 which was formally registered on Oct. 29, 1863. The third school, a stone school, was built in 1866 across the road from the second school and the lot where the second school stood was sold back to George Zimmerman.

The Spring Creek School closed in February 1966. The school bell was taken and incorporated into a carin in front of the old township offices on Quarry Road in 1969, and it is still there.

Beam Theatre

The Beam Theatre

As written by Bill Rannie, "The Beam was the brainchild of four or five Beamsville men, notably Frank Thompson (Druggist); Clarence Buck (Buck's Funeral); Roy Saunders (Town Councillor and Reeve); Merrill Thompson (Dairyman) and a couple other minor financial donors".

The building was built in 1946-1947 by Cornie Unrau and is now the present site of the Home Hardware in Beamsville.

A Beamsville Express April 9, 1947 article said; "The plans for the theatre were sent to the seat manufacturer who then designed the seats according to the pitch of the floor and the dimensions of the hall to ensure the best possible vision from every seat. For its time it was said that the theatre was state of the art. The seats were to have been the most comfortable seats theatre patrons had ever used ".

The building at the time was very modern with air conditioning and other modern conveniences such as a snack bar and washrooms. The facility was managed by Ralph Humphrey. Besides movies there was also some Sunday concerts. The theatre closed its doors in June of 1958.

According to a Bill Rannie article from 1986, The Beam Theatre was not the first theatre around. He said, "Harry Robinson hastily put together a theatre, taking advantage of the influx of Royal Flying Corps trainees at the field just east of Bartlett Road in 1917. It closed right after Armistice Day. Robinson converted the silent movie house into a bowling alley and pool hall".
